

Designing for Pedestrians and Disabled Users

This programme of three modules aims at creating usable streets for pedestrians, removing barriers to movement, introduces guidance and techniques to assess and improve the pedestrian environment, and discusses planning for the future.

Module 1 is a half-day awareness seminar for all planning personnel and senior managers. It covers the legal and policy framework, the meaning and importance of “walkability”, how to secure improved walking conditions, and why to do so.

Module 2 is more detailed two day course for traffic engineers, transport planners and urban designers involved in the design and delivery of schemes for pedestrians and disabled users. The first day discusses design principles, the process for delivering facilities from concept to implementation, the different types of solution, how to think and design from a pedestrian’s perspective, and the importance of balancing the needs of all users. The second day concentrates on the needs of disabled people, including the policy and legal context, and accessibility auditing.

Module 3 builds on Module 2 to introduce the PERS tool to assess the performance of pedestrian facilities, and to identify opportunities and priorities for improvement.
